Key Characteristics of project

- Collaborative project (City, community groups, etc)
- Foster more accessible, inclusive, enabling & supportive environments for all seniors in Ottawa
- Use processes of community engagement and action
- Involve the full diversity of seniors
- Communication of project work through newsletter & website
- Evaluation work & accomplishments

Year One

- Community engagement – involve seniors & seniors organizations
- Environmental scan – build on prior initiatives ie. Successful Aging Ottawa & City of Ottawa seniors agenda
- Conduct focus groups & individual interviews
- Identify areas needing work
- Develop indicators of progress
- Conduct public workshop
- Produce report card
- Communicate project work & results

Year Two

- Setting and implementing priorities
 - Develop a city-wide action plan
 - Select one or two priorities
 - With community workgroups develop action plan for each priority selected & begin to implement the changes needed
 - Evaluate using the indicators to monitor progress
 - Communicate project work

Year Three

- Implementing priorities and evaluation
 - Select another one or more priorities
 - With community workgroups, develop action plan for each priority selected & begin to implement the changes needed
 - Continue implementation of initial priority areas
 - Evaluate using the indicators to monitor progress
 - Communicate project work
 - Evaluate process, accomplishment and prepare an overall report
